Jena Chun-Wah Pang is based in the United Kingdom and has an international reputation for teaching and judging competitions and scholarship awards. The Honor Jackson Memorial Trophy for Piano Playing

Honor Jackson, LRAM, who died on 12th December 2005, was for fifteen years the Convenor of the Piano Section of our Festival – a well-known and highly respected teacher, she brought her knowledge, experience and wonderful organisational skills to bear in making this element of the Festival such a success.

Honor made a very important contribution to the musical life of the Borough – through her teaching, enthusiasm, encouragement and example to a large number of pupils (many of whom were, indeed, children of former pupils), and by being the instigator and driving force behind the South-East Essex Branch of the European Piano Teachers' Association.

Honor gave of her time unstintingly. A consummate musical professional, she invariably put others before herself and brought characteristic good humour to all she did. In spite of her illness, she attended every meeting of the Festival Committee in 2005, organised the Syllabus and Programme for the Piano Section, and came to the evening performances of the competitions. Her final act, on the same day that she entered hospital for the last time, was to give a lesson, on a technically demanding piano work, to a pupil who was preparing for an important audition at one of our Universities.

We will all miss Honor, not only as a loyal supporter of the Festival but as a wonderful person and a dear friend, who will be long-remembered. Margaret Rowan, who took over as Convenor of the Piano Section, said of Honor: "As a teacher, she was second to none; I was taught by her myself and was amazed at her vast knowledge and understanding of music. She was always ready to help and willing to advise. Her standards were high and, like everyone I have spoken to, I feel her presence and personality in all the music I play."

The Katie Ayers Cup (Pianoforte)

It was with great sadness that the Festival acknowledged the death of Kathleen (Katie) Marjorie Ayers, in February 2003. Katie was a much-valued accompanist and staunch supporter of the Festival for many years, and will always be greatly missed by all who had the pleasure of knowing her.

Born in Harringay in 1919, Katie moved to Leigh-on-Sea and attended St Michael's School, then went on to Westcliff High School for Girls, where she excelled academically. She learnt piano from Vera Harding, winning medals in local festivals, and, in recognition of outstanding playing in such festivals, was awarded three Chapple medals during the 1930s. She also played the violin. At the outbreak of war, she offered to use her musical talents as part of a concert party entertaining the troops.

When Katie retired in 1973 from a long and successful career in banking, she devoted her considerable energies to music – playing for keep fit classes, dancing lessons, ballet exams, old people's clubs, choirs, and, of course, singers – always recognising talent and encouraging enthusiasm in the young and the not so young.

The last individual prize that Katie won was in the Stratford Festival in 2001, but most people will remember her for her contribution as part of a team or group – she may have been only 4 feet 11½ inches tall, but she has left a noticeable gap in many people's lives and will be remembered with affection and gratitude.

The Muriel Muddiman Encouragement Trophy

In memory of Mrs Muriel E Muddiman (12/2/1918-11/5/2001)

Mrs Muddiman was born Muriel Ethel Terrell in Leytonstone, East London, and was educated at Norlington Road Council School from where, in 1929, encouraged by a devoted teacher, she and her peers gained scholarships to the Leyton County High School for Girls.

Muriel attended the Metropolitan Academy of Music in Leytonstone for pianoforte under the inspiring tutelage of Miss Ryan, with who Muriel most enjoyed playing Haydn duets. Although she successfully passed all the academy exams up to Gold Medal standard, she was prevented from taking this last exam through family and personal illmess, and then the advent of war.

At High School, she matriculated with credit in music in 1935 and was also an enthusiastic player in the netball and tennis teams. Playing the piano for the Sunday School and Girls' Life Brigade Companu at the Leytonstone Congregational Church gave Muriel regular opportunity to use and improve her talents. Here, also, at an early age, she met Frank and after growing up together in the Church, they were married there in 1942. After starting a family and moving to Rayleigh in 1958, Muriel again played for the Sunday School and Boys Brigade, putting the zip into their Physical Training and Marching exercises. It was when one of the admiring junior boys said "I wish I could play like you, Miss" that Muriel was inspired to start teaching. "You could, if you had lessons" Muriel told him, but "My mum can't afford lessons" he replied. So his lessons were started at sixpence a week, and very soon many other boys and girls were welcomed to her home to learn to play, until lessons peaked at 21 pupils. In addition, for some years Muriel taught piano and theory at the Beauchamps Music School under David Stowe, with pupils passing thier exams with terms of 10 fifteeen minute lessons, necessitating split-second readiness by pupil and teacher and much home practice.

Second only to her family, Muriels greatest delight was to encourage youngsters to learn to play, implanting in them a love of music which fostered confidence in their own ability and in other aspects of their lives. To this end, she devoted very much of her time, entering them for Associated Board Exams where appropriate, but trying to achieve at least grade 5 standard with all her pupils. Latterly she was even asked to coach the fathers of some of her older pupils. Nevertheless, she kept an expert hand on her own home, family mad garden and continued to play for the Sunday School and Boys' Brigade. What perhaps thrilled her the most during family visitis was to accompnay her granddaughters practising recorder, trombone, piano and bassoon. After Muriel's death many former pupils recorded the pleasure with which they attended their lessons, because of Muriel's kindly patient understanding, her enthusiasm and her friendship.

The Joan Bransgrove Memorial Trophy

A brief history of the life of Joan Elizabeth Bransgrove by her husband of fifty years. Although I am naturally biased, Joan was an extraordinary person. Growing up during a period that was marred by the second world war, it was very difficult for children to get a stable start to life and so it was for Joan. Local schools were disbanded, so along with her mother she was moved to Wales to join her father who was working there. Fortunately, her elder brother Fred (later to become a prominent teacher), about to join the army, visited them and got her installed in a Pitman college to train as a secretary. She succeeded so well that she was entered in an all-England competition and won second place.

It was not until much later, back home in Ilford, that brother Fred came to guide her, this time for a musical training with a local teacher, Madame McConnell, with whom she studied for several years. She became a family friend, especially with the son and daughter of her teacher. The daughter, Jan, became an established professional singer and son, Christopher, a very good violinist (alternating at concerts with Yehudi Menuhin) and later becoming a conductor of the London Philharmonic and Birmingham Youth orchestras among others. Sadly, ill health ended his career.

Unfortunately, Joan was slightly injured during the war when a bomb caused a shop front window to get sucked out, which landed – intact – on top of her and a few other passersby. This left her with a slightly damaged ligament in her left hand which limited her field as a performer, although I believe she did entertain at some air force bases.

Her musical career was to extend over some fifty years! She achieved success with many piano pupils, especially one Colin Davis, who started as a three-year-old, won many Festival cups and went on to study at Cheethams college. She also taught piano to many local children and their parents, including some of the Todman family in Rayleigh comprising Heather, her daughter, and her husband and his brother. She even taught a Down's syndrome child through several examinations. Joan sent many pupils to both Leigh and Southend Musical Festivals, where many awards were won.

Sadly, some fifteen years ago, John suffered an unexplained neck problem that required serious surgery which was only partially successful. It is possible that the war-time incident was the real cause. It left her in considerable pain for long periods but she carried on teaching right up to a few weeks before she was diagnosed with the dreaded cancer and had only a few weeks to live. A sad and unwarranted ending to an eventful life.

The Chan Family Trophy

This trophy was donated by the family in 2010, to be awarded to the winner of the Piano Solo (7 years) class. Both Cara (13 years old in 2010) and Ashlynn Chan (8 years old in 2010) play the piano as their first instrument.

Cara started playing on her sixth birthday and made quick progress through her grades to the point where she was playing at Grade 5 standard by the age of 9. She has been participating in local musical festivals since she was 8 years old, with numerous successes. Since May 2008, Cara has been studying with Derek Rodgers; in summer 2009, during a workshop at a local school with concert pianist Richard Meyrick, she was identified as showing real potential and was awarded the Piano Man scholarship (sponsored by Man Group plc) to attend a series of individual Master Classes with Richard Meyrick at the Piano Studio in the City of London. This scholarship is awarded to up to 20 young pianists from all over the UK each year. Cara also plays the flute, which she studies with Ann-Francis Ellis, and successfully auditioned at Brentwood Youth Orchestra when she was 11 – making her the youngest member of this senior orchestra. At school, Cara is a member of the Senior Flute Choir and the Concert Orchestra, accompanies the Senior Choir and has represented the school on numerous occasions. She has been awarded prizes for exceptional achievement in Music, both in and out of school. Cara is preparing to take her Grade 8 piano exam in Spring 2011.

When Cara's younger sister, Ashlynn, wanted to play the piano at the age of 5, it took a while to find a teacher who would take a pupil at such a young age. Ashlynn began to participate in festivals at the age of 6 and took everything in her stride! She managed to win most of the classes she entered, some with several competitors, including older children. She is now learning the Cornet and passed her Grade 2 with distinction in summer 2010 – she plays in a Brass Ensemble and a Wind Band at school.

At the 2009 Southend Musical Festival, Ashlynn narrowly missed winning the 7 years set piece class, but did win the own choice class – at which point it became apparent that this was one of the few classes in the Piano Section which did not have a trophy to award to the winner. In recognition of the value of the Music Festival, and the pleasure that they have derived from attending over the years, the Chan family has kindly donated this trophy so that future young winners will have the pleasure of taking it home to mark their achievement and remember the joy of music-making.

She is proud to have been amongst those little performers fifty years ago and proud also to be involved now in teaching the young musicians of 2011 and giving them the same opportunities.

The Jena Pang Challenge Award

Jena Chun-Wah Pang is based in the United Kingdom and has an international reputation for teaching and judging competitions and scholarship awards. His students are based in the United Kingdom, Hong Kong, Beijing, Geneva, Milan, Vienna, New York and Calgary, regularly compete in international competitions and music festivals around the world and have won several first, second and third prizes at the Clavis International Piano Competition 2018 in St Petersburg Russia; the Amigdala International Piano Competition 2019 and 2021 in Italy; Feurich International Piano Competition 2019 and 2018 Vienna; Costa Festa International Piano Competition 2019 Spain; Canadian Music Competition 2019 (violin); Tadini International Piano Competition 2019 Italy; London Young Musician International Piano Competition 2021; Harmonium Plus International Piano Competition Armenia 2020, Music and Stars International Piano Competition 2020; Monegro 88 Keys International Piano Competition 2021 Spain, Carmel Arts International Piano Competition USA 2022, and winners of the finals of the 2020 EPTA-UK piano competition. Several of this students have also won the prestigious Elena Cobb Star Prize Award and have performed at the Royal Albert Hall.

The Andrew Palmer Cup

Andrew Palmer is a local teacher and musician who has a great passion for the genre of the piano duet (one piano, four hands). Having qualified with a music degree at Surrey University in the late 1980s, he has since pursued a teaching career, while being involved in the local music scene through directing, performing - both as soloist and accompanist and teaching the piano and singing. Andrew donated this cup to the Festival in 2007, and has explained his love of duets as follows: One of my earliest and happiest memories of learning to play the piano was the opportunity to play duets with my teacher as part of my lessons. Suddenly, there was an opportunity to explore different octaves of the keyboard and to make a whole new exciting sound. Duets are enormously helpful in developing skills of rhythm and good time-keeping, listening and performance, and when played well make a magical sound. However, piano duets are certainly not easy to play, as great concentration and a sensitive touch is needed to make sure that both parts are equal and remain together throughout – a good communication is essential, especially in tricky passages involving crossing hands! I have continued to play duets and have often included them in recitals that I have given. Pianists so often play alone or as an accompanist, so it is great to be equal partners. Playing duets is great fun and there is some wonderful repertoire. In the 18th and 19th centuries, most great orchestral works were transcribed for piano duet and were a way of introducing music to an audience before recordings. One of my favourite sets that I have played are the Beethoven Symphonies, which sound fantastic and are hugely enjoyable to play. I still play duets as an adult with friends, pupils and my own children. There are some really good jazz duets now available which work very well. I hope that this cup will reward and encourage young players to continue and develop their pianistic journey and would hope that duets will remain part of their regular repertoire.

The H T Neath Memorial Shield

The Neath family was associated with the Festival for many years. This new trophy was received in 1967 for home music. There is no record of the shield being awarded until the programme of 1978 when it was awarded to the competitor obtaining the highest marks in classes 85 and 86 (Duet 10 years and under, and duet 10, 11, 12 and 13 years). In 2005 it was awarded to the highest mark in Piano Duet Beginners/Transition Classes 182 and 183.

The Frank Bonner Cup

In 1979, the syllabus and programme listed the Frank Bonner Prize of £10 to be awarded to the competitor with the highest mark in the Strings, Piano and Solo Singing Section. This continued until 1988. In 1989 it was listed as the Frank Bonner Prize in the List of Cups but not quoted in classes. In the syllabus for 1995 it was shown as the Frank Bonner Cup, but again not listed in classes. This continues until 2005.
